2019 Year in Review

As we end 2019, we take a minute to reflect on some of this year's newsletter highlights, a small part of the work that we have accomplished this year. We kicked off 2019 with the completion of the [Golden Triangle Planning Study](#), an ongoing initiative of the City of Framingham since 2016. In February, Framingham was featured on the [OA on Air podcast](#), where interviews took place with Gabriele Brambilla, CEO of [Alira Health](#), Sam Hendler, Co-Founder of [Jack's Abby](#), and Art Robert, former Director of Framingham's Division of Community

Several businesses have recently opened their doors in Framingham. After months of construction, [Dunkin'](#), located at 3 Nicholas Road at the intersection of Nicholas Road and Water Street, recently opened for business. The 22-seat restaurant is open daily from 5am to 10pm, offering free wi-fi to customers.

[D'mar Electronics](#),

had their grand opening earlier in December. Originally founded in 2004 by Rosiane Domar Nelson, the store offers the

& Economic Development. When spring rolled in, leaders from local biotech, pharma, healthcare, MedTech and life science-based businesses, municipal offices, and economic and business development organizations launched the MetroWest Life Sciences Network at a [special event](#).



In May, the City announced its partnership with MassDevelopment and Patronicity to build a new [pocket park](#) on the south side of Framingham, a project that had been in the works since late 2018, which will add critical open space to the densest part of the City. In June, the City announced it had not only achieved, but also surpassed its fundraising goal of \$50,000, securing the grant match from MassDevelopment and resulting in a [grand total of \\$105,855](#) for the new park. Additionally in July, Alta Union House, a new 196-unit rental community, opened to new residents. This was the first major project completed after the City of Framingham revamped its downtown zoning in 2015 to encourage transit-oriented development (TOD) and the first major private sector investment in Framingham in decades. [In July](#), the City Council voted unanimously to approve the proposed Nobscot Village (B-4) Zoning that was recommended by both the Planning Board and the Subcommittee on Planning and Zoning, after an almost 5-year public process. Throughout the year, the Framingham Brownfields Program provided free environmental assessments to commercial properties throughout the city. In August, we [highlighted](#) several success stories in Framingham, where initial federal funding, including an apartment building at 68 South Street and the new Christa McAuliffe Branch Library at 746 Water Street led to eventual redevelopment that benefited the community. Also in August, the [Village Hall](#) on the Common at 2 Oak Street, opened for business after a major 2-year renovation. Finally, In November, City Council voted to allow businesses in the core of Downtown Framingham to [utilize the sidewalk](#) in front of their businesses to extend their commercial presence.

We look forward to another year of economic success in 2020...Stay tuned!

Saxonville Mills - 2 Watson Place

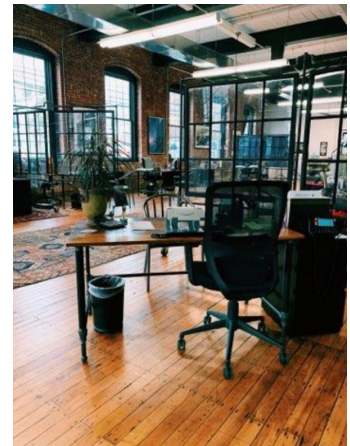
[Saxonville Mills](#), a dynamic, former 19th century factory located in northeast Framingham has three spaces coming up for lease now. The complex is managed by Creative Development Company and boast a vibrant mix of creative and small business professionals, including the [Saxonville Studios](#), [Fireseed Arts](#), [Framingham Makerspace](#), and [Red 13 Studios](#), that often work in synergy with each other.



The property at 2 Watson Place is conveniently located off Route 126, near the Massachusetts Turnpike, at the center of the historic Saxonville commercial district, which boasts numerous restaurants and shops. It is also within walking distance of the trailhead for the Cochituate Rail Trail which currently extends to Route 30 and Speen Street in the Golden Triangle and which will extend all the way to Natick Center in the next 3 years.

The three available spaces within the Mills include: 1) 2,500-3,000 SQFT, 2) 5,000-13,500 SQFT, and 3) 27,000 SQFT. All spaces have cement floors, large windows, and high ceilings. Build to suit is available and prices range from \$8.00 NNN to \$15.00 NNN.

Framingham Home Rule Charter (Article V, Section 4, page 36), the Director will be responsible for the coordination of all the planning and community development-related functions of the municipality. Shea received an undergraduate degree in Urban Studies and Political Science from Canisius College in Buffalo, NY, and a Master's degree in Urban Affairs from Boston University. Prior to his experience in Taunton, he served as director of community and economic development in Barnstable, executive director of the Pawtucket, R.I., Redevelopment Agency; principal city planner in Quincy; housing and economic development planner in Chelsea; and community development coordinator in New Bedford.

Shea will work with the Framingham Economic Development and Industrial Corporation (EDIC) which consists of seven Framingham residents voted in by City Council. The EDIC was established in 1995 to stimulate economic development and expand employment opportunities in the City of Framingham in accordance with the City's approved economic development plans. The current EDIC members include a deep bench of individuals with strong business and development experience that they bring to benefit Framingham. The members include Doug Lawrence (Chair), Dan Rao (Vice Chair), Ronda Andrews, Andrew D'Amico, Anthony James, George Matook, and Angela Randolph. Lawrence is a former town meeting member who served on the Standing Committee and Planning and Zoning. He has a background as S&P 200 Medical devices industry executive. Rao was also a former town meeting member who served as a Member of the Moderator appointed Capital Budget Committee and on the Standing Committee on Planning and Zoning. He is the President and CEO of EGI, Opt Now Real Estate and WHY.com. Andrews, a third former town meeting member, represents the south side of Framingham. She is an activist for environmental properties including General Chemical, Mary Dennison Park and 350 Irving Street. D'Amico is a lawyer with experience in community development and redevelopment. James currently works for Marriott and served on an EDIC in his previous town. Matook is currently working as the Program Manager for the US Army Combat Capabilities Development Command Soldier Center and has experience working with MassDev Military Task Force. Randolph is an Assistant Professor at Babson College in Entrepreneurship Department with expertise in finance.
